

International Diabetes Monitor

Guidelines for preparation of a Review Article

The International Diabetes Monitor focuses on trends in clinical diabetes. Its purpose is to help the diabetes health care team keep abreast of advances in diabetes.

Text

Articles should be about 2500 words in length and be submitted by email to beverley.martin@btinternet.com.

Please define all abbreviations the first time they occur. Only international generic drug names should be used; trade names should be avoided, except where two products with the same generic name are being compared.

The first page of the manuscript should contain the article title, the name and full professional affiliation of the author and full postal address (including fax and email).

Acknowledgements, references, tables, captions and figures should be added at the end of the article.

Main headings within the paper should be clearly distinguished from subheadings.

Greek letters, superior and inferior numbers and letters should be clearly indicated.

Copy-edited manuscripts may not be returned to authors for checking unless questions have arisen during editing or substantial changes have been made to the text. However, authors will receive proofs for approval.

Abstract and key words

Please include an abstract of approximately 250 words and provide 6 indexing terms.

Implications for clinical practice

If applicable, please provide a box (or boxes) highlighting the implications for clinical practice raised by your article

Call-outs

To enhance the appearance of your article, if there are any particularly important points in the text that could be emphasised, please put the relevant short section of text (approx. 2 lines) in full capitals and it will appear on the proof as a highlighted 'call-out'.

Figures and tables

Please include some relevant figures and/or tables with your article. The number of figures/tables is left to the discretion of the author, but Review Articles usually contain between 3 and 6 illustrations. These should be numbered in the order in which they appear in the text and accompanied by a legend. Units of measurement should be clearly given for all data. If you wish to include digital photographs, they should be of high resolution (at least 300 dpi) and preferably submitted as jpeg or tiff files.

References

PLEASE DO NOT SUBMIT REFERENCES AS ENDNOTES.

The number of references is left to the author's discretion. However, a maximum of about 60 seems reasonable.

References should be numbered in the order in which they are first cited in the text. The number, in square brackets, e.g. [1], should be shown clearly in the text and the complete bibliographical information given in a reference list at the end of the paper.

The accuracy of the references is the responsibility of the author. Please ensure that all details are complete and correct and given according to the Vancouver style (see examples below). Please note: list all authors if there are four or fewer; if there are five or more, list the first three only and add 'et al'.
